As I was a-walk - ing out one May morn - ing down by the ri - ver - side

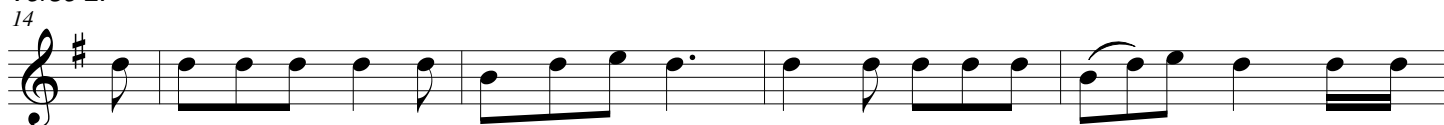


There I spied a jol-ly har-rin' come row - ing down by the tide that was for-ty feet wide and

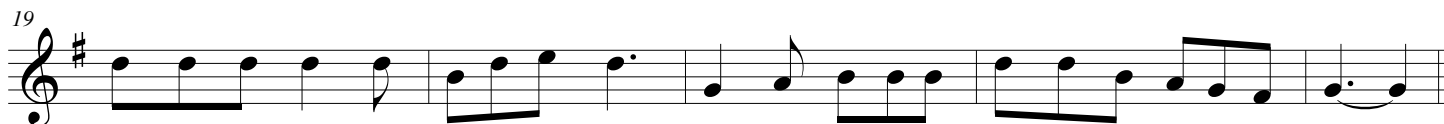

O what do you think I made with his head? There was o-ver ten loaves of bread, there was

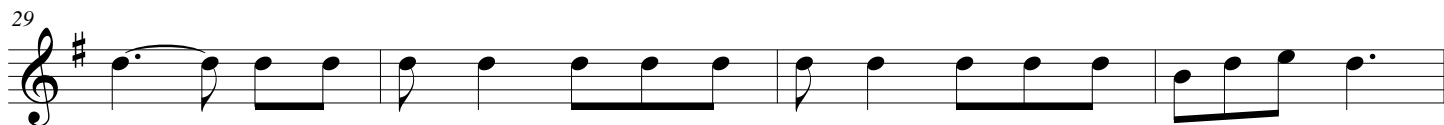


ten loaves of bread and oth-er fine things. Don't you think I did well with my jol-ly har - rin'?

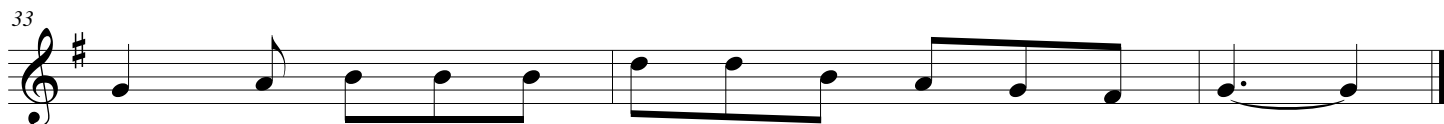
